STRESSED-OUT public servants cost \$20 million and 56,000 work days over the past three years, with the risk to teachers almost double any other profession.

WorkSafe Tasmania data obtained by the Sunday Tasma-nian reveals 565 claims for

mental illness, mostly stress, in the three years to March this year,

Teachers, with 104 claims, top the list, while midwives and nurses (63), health and welfare support workers (45), defence, fire and police officers (40) and clerical support workers (38) round out the top five.
